Top of the Class

MCS is celebrating another year of outstanding exam results at both A Level and GCSE.

Our Upper Sixth pupils enjoyed great success on A Level results day, with over 96% of all results graded A*-B, over 82% of grades at A*-A and just under 44% at A*. We are delighted to report that subjects such as Music, English and Modern Foreign Languages are flourishing at MCS despite a marked decline in pupils studying these subjects nationally.

18 pupils achieved four or more A*s.

Particular congratulations to pupils Jamie, Henry and Ben who attained 5 A*s each and will take up places at Cambridge in September.

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September is the new January: the beginning of the school year is a joyful time, and this newsletter looks back as much as it looks forward. August brings its harvest of exam results, and we have garnered startlingly strong headlines once again. Over 96% of our A Levels were graded A*-B, with over 82% of these being an A* or an A. Over 93% of our GCSE results were also graded A* or A (or 9-7 in new money). Over forty of our leavers are heading to Oxford and Cambridge, and our Sixth Form has welcomed record numbers of new pupils. There is much to celebrate, and with this joy comes the resolve to make this academic year another remarkable and fulfilling one.

Thanks to the summer works carried out by the maintenance team, our grounds look spry-- as do our returning teachers, for now at least. By November these balmy days will be a distant memory; but the warm Bank Holiday weekend evoked memories of Trinity Term, the highlights of which are evoked for you here. Our Arts Festival, the culmination of perennial partnerships with dozens of schools and others, was our best ever in many ways. Our impact beyond our white bridges is so strong that we have devoted a separate publication to it, and I hope you will read this alongside this newsletter.

Our tennis players and cricketers had another distinguished season, and a number of boys continued to play at county and national level over the summer. July and August also saw a number of trips: our musicians toured in Italy, our Hockey players were in South Africa and our rowers trained in Nottingham, to name but a few. Much pre-season training augurs well for a fine term of fixtures.

Our Fifth Form pupils achieved equally highly on GCSE results day, with over 82% at 9-8 (A*) grades and 93% at 9-7 (A*-A) grades. 35 boys achieved straight 9 and 8 (A*) grades, and over 10% of the year group achieved 10 or more 9 (A*+) grades.

Particularly strong results were seen in science subjects, with an average of 89% at 9-8 (A*) grades for Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Maths and Computer Science. In Classical and Modern Languages, 86% of results were graded 9-8 (A*).

Coordinated by resident producer Katie Walsh, the cast was led by Lower Sixth actors Ilona, Aisling, Will and Christian as the four confused lovers, while younger pupils Sam and Michael wowed as Puck and Bottom respectively. This year's Field Play at the Arts Festival was 18th -century romp, The Recruiting Officer. The departing Upper Sixth gave memorable

performances, with James, Daniel, Charlotte, Giorgia, Ben, Yiannis, Tom and Sasha in lead roles. Also as part of the Arts Festival, Upper Sixth pupils Orlando and Nik produced and directed their own adaptation of Aristophanes' The Frogs.

Earlier in the term, Director in Residence Samson Hawkins oversaw The Lower School Theatre Academy's production of The Hobbit - a boisterous and imaginative performance starring a cast of Second and Third Form actors.



Magical May Morning Sport at Magdalen



Once again, record crowds turned out for the 'dawn chorus' of the Hymnus Eucharisticus and other madrigals from atop Magdalen College Tower on May Morning. This year, their performance ended with a moving rendition of Over the Rainbow, a number from the Junior School's production of The Wizard of Oz. Oxford's May Morning tradition dates back to the early 16th century. Magdalen College Choir, which includes 16 MCS boys, traditionally sings from the tower at 6am on the 1st May to herald the rising sun and the coming of Spring.



In June, MCS hosted the Gary Kirsten Foundation cricketers from Khayelitsha, the first township side ever to leave South Africa. A brilliant game ended in last ball tie in a great experience for both sides.

Junior School Celebrates **Jubilee** Year



Pupils started Trinity Term having returned from The Junior School's first ever ski trip. 51 boys hit the slopes, battling challenging weather conditions, but a great time was had by all on and off the piste. Term began with another successful House Music, watched by an unprecedented number of parents, and the ever-popular J1 Family Sleepover which saw boys and their families set up camp in the Sports Hall. Grandparents were welcomed again for Tours and Teas, before the summer musical, The Wizard of Oz, burst onto the Big School stage.

In July, the Junior School celebrated its 25 Year Jubilee with a party in the marquee and an afternoon of Rounders for boys and their families on School Field. While younger choristers had been educated for centuries, the advent of the 'Junior Section' in 1993 saw School House repurposed to accommodate just two classes of 37 pupils. Today, 141 pupils call the Junior School home.

MCS Connections

125th Anniversary of School House

The Boarding House was the first MCS building in Cowley Place, which eventually gave way to the site we see today. The move was prompted by concern about conditions in the old boarding house on the High Street, following an outbreak of scarlet fever in the early 1890s. The popular local architect Sir Arthur Blomfield designed School House, building the new accommodation on the site of 'The Willows' and its surrounding cottages. Magdalen College obtained a lease from Christ Church for the island to serve as School Field for activities, connected by the now iconic white bridges. The building was completed in 1894, featuring accommodation for boarding pupils and The Master's family. The last Master to live in School House was Tim Hands, leaving 20 years after the last boarders. The building served as a military hospital during WW1 until the Army Medical Authorities could prepare a larger one. As the boarding house for over 100 years, boys progressed from 'Baby Dorm' to Top, Middle and Bottom 'End' where they studied and relaxed. The beginning of 1992 saw the refurbishment of the top floor of School House for the boarders, which created the teaching spaces for fledgling Junior School pupils below.





Connecting to Our History



The MCS Archive provides a link to the past as well as being an important repository for the information assets of the modern school. In this edition of the Newsletter, Dr David Bebbington shares his favourite pieces from the archive.

"The MCS archive contains a treasure trove of items that allow a glimpse of the schools' past, encourage you to discover more about the characters that inhabited the school in days gone by and who helped shape the school we see today. I am particularly in awe of the sporting medals won by Noel Chavasse together with and his Glengarry hat from the Great War. The panoramic picture of the Cadet Corps in 1928, with its fascinating backdrop of familiar buildings and the size of the corps with its military band is also very special, but my favourite items within the archive have to be the sequence of black and white sports team photos from the late nineteenth to mid-twentieth century. These fantastically clear photos exude each boys character and give a time-lapse style glimpse as individual boys grow and mature through their school years".

From the Waynflete Office

As we welcome new pupils and parents to the school, we also welcome around 450 people who join the network of Old Waynfletes and Friends. That's 150+ leavers and the parents. Our role in the Waynflete Office is to keep in touch with Old Waynfletes and their parents. That means that we look out for ways to support the school's current priorities and our pupils' education, and create opportunities for all the MCS community.

But this is not just an internally facing task. MCS aims to equip pupils to make a positive and lasting contribution to their communities, both now and in the future. The school is fortunate in the strength and depth of its partnerships within the city, university, education and many sectors of public and corporate expertise. Through our networks we can work with others. Sometimes that's initiating a discussion, connecting the dots perhaps, which lead to something that's bigger than the sum of the parts. The biosciences course is a great example of that.

Of course we have the task of finding financial support to make things happen, whether that's in the classroom or about the people. The school itself is stronger if it reflects the excellence and diversity of Oxford and the surrounding areas, so bursaries are a continuous and ongoing priority for us in our fundraising agenda.

Scott Crawford, Deputy Head, said: "we were delighted to be able to work with Brookes to develop this course, which feels a real need for young bioscientists."
